Adrienne Olivier, our dog school manager, continues to tirelessly promote the aims and objectives of the organisation. We are very grateful for the effort and knowledge she brings to the team.

Christine Klapprodt unfortunately left us to return with her family to Germany and has been replaced by the very able Dr Daniela Steckler and we are thankful for her input. We are also grateful to the extended veterinary team which also includes the assistance from Howick Small Animal Clinic and the State Veterinary Dept.

I wish to thank all our volunteers, community assistants, donors and supporters for their contributions and support. Without which, Funda Nenja would not have enjoyed the successful past year. We hope that we can continue with the same support and success in the coming year.

# Dog School Manager's Report

## Overview

The Funda Nenja Dog School has always played a pivotal role in our organisation as it acts as the portal into the community of Mpophomeni which we serve. It is where values such as kindness, respect and compassion are nurtured through the practical hands-on activity of dog training and our One Welfare model. However, the Covid 19 Pandemic saw us being forced to adapt our approach as lockdown restrictions limited our regular Friday afternoon classes and the management team had to rethink how we could still serve the community despite the challenges we faced.

## The Dog Training Programme

On average, in the past, we have usually had about 35 dog school sessions per annum, but this past financial year saw us holding only 15 sessions from March 2020 to February 2021, due to lockdown restrictions on mass gatherings. No classes were held from mid March until the beginning of September when the restrictions eased somewhat.

Our registered attendance of 105 children and dogs in March dropped to 31 in September when the dog school reopened after a break of 6 months, and then rose to 78 by the end of 2020. No classes were held in January and February 2021 when the second wave of Covid 19 spread across the country. However, we did register 24 new handlers and dogs over June and August so that home visits and sterilisations could be arranged, making a total new intake of 103 over the year. Most of these learners were boys averaging 12 years of age, with girls accounting for slightly more than 1% of attendees.

Special mention must be made of the generous monthly donation of dog food used for the dog school training programme by the Do- More Foundation and the Gabrielle Faickney Charitable Trust.





## Relocation of venue

In October Funda Nenja received formal notice to leave the premises from Zamuthule Primary School which has provided us with our venue for the past 10 years. After a significant amount of research and debate we approached Sifisesihle Primary School which is the same neighbourhood and were delighted when a memorandum of understanding was drawn up and signed by both parties.

Moving all our office equipment, in addition to dismantling roofing and relocating 4 shipping containers proved to be a huge task, all of which was efficiently managed by our project administrator. Our new "home" is a work in progress, but we are certain that both the Funda Nenja and school communities will enjoy a mutually beneficial relationship for many years to come.



## Volunteers and Community Assistants

Volunteers and community assistants are an essential part of the dog school and we had an average of 22 helpers, in addition to our 5 staff members, assisting at our Friday afternoon training sessions. The team members assist with distribution of juice and fruit as well as dog food to the children, sales of collars, leads, dog food and kennels, preparing treat bags for our handlers, primary veterinary care, stock control, photos for media releases, and class instruction. Our community assistants are from the local community of Mpophomeni, while volunteers come from the surrounding areas of Pietermaritzburg, Hilton and Howick.



Our Community Assistants all receive a modest monthly stipend in appreciation of their commitment and contribution to the initiative.

In view of the ever present risk of rabies in KZN and the high risk associated with the handling of unknown dogs, all our dog school team members are regularly given the recommended prophylactic rabies treatment as a precaution. Three new members of the team were given this treatment at our cost as the state no longer provides a free service prior to rabies exposure.



## Education and Skills Development

The up-skilling and development of our community assistants continues to be a priority and despite the challenges presented by the pandemic, we managed to arrange a workshop on good work ethic and another on gender-based violence presented by our social workers.

Our Animal Welfare Education Officer attended a week-long course covering the Animal Protection Act hosted by the Animal Welfare Society in Johannesburg. This was a wonderful experience for her and broadened her understanding of the legal aspects of animal welfare.



## Welfare

On Friday afternoons primary veterinary health care is provided to the local dog owning community by our voluntary Veterinary team (full details in the project administrator's report) while items such as kennels, dog food, collars and leashes are all sold for a nominal sum. Once dog owners have given written permission to get their dogs sterilised, each dog is issued with a free dog bowl and dog blanket.

Funda Nenja believes that the welfare of the children attending the programme goes hand in hand with the welfare of the dogs so every child attending the classes on Friday afternoons was given a juice and a piece of fruit each week, thanks to the generous sponsorship of local supermarkets. At Christmas the children were treated with a gift bag filled with treats for both themselves and their dogs thanks to the support of kind donors.



## Conclusion

We have seen a drop in the number of learners from our senior classes since the reopening of the dog training programme after the long enforced break. This is not totally unexpected, but we are doing what we can to encourage these learners to return to classes.

We have noted with some concern an increasing number of Pit Bull type dogs attending classes and seeking veterinary care at our weekly clinic. Whilst the majority of these dogs are in excellent physical condition, the ability of the young dog handlers, and even adult dog owners, to handle these strong dogs has been questionable. We have also noticed an increase in simulated dog fighting in the community which has prompted us to formulate an educational and awareness programme in this regard.

The Dog School team continues to strive to improve all facets of the Friday afternoon programme and self-evaluation takes place regularly so that weak areas can be improved upon. We are most thankful for the commitment and support of all those who contribute to the success of this vital component of the Funda Nenja initiative.

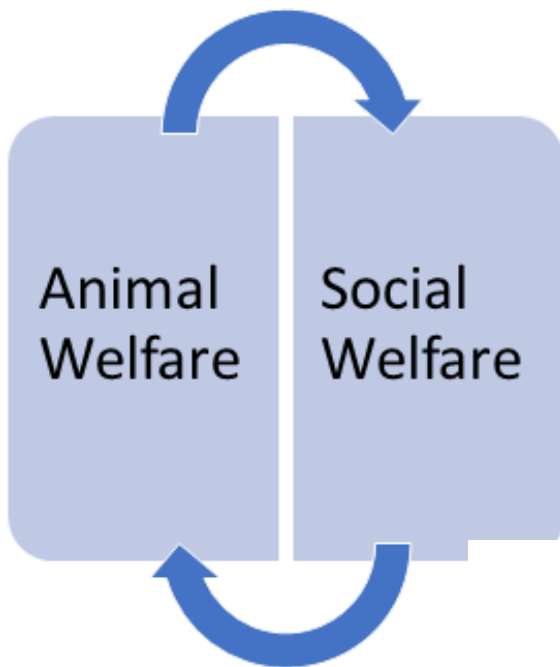

Once lockdown levels were reduced, we were able to once again continue with our usual activities but adhered to strict Covid-19 protocols.

# Administration & Funding

In order to comply with relevant authorities and donors Funda Nenja policies and procedures are reviewed annually. Although the organisation is still relatively small in comparison with most NPO's, we take the guidance of the King III report on governance seriously and are attempting to implement relevant policies in decision making and in financial management. Donor funds are utilised according to the terms and conditions set out in contracts.

Staff and volunteer suitability is reviewed and parent indemnity is secured.

2020 saw more staff changes when Rene Morcom left the team and we employed of our new Auxiliary Social Worker, Zinhle Msimango, as well as the employment of a driver, Vincent Mncwabe. We also bid a very sad farewell to our volunteer Vet Nurse, Christine Klapprodt as she and her family moved back to Germany.

In September 2020 we received a visit from Network For Animals who put together a wonderful video, summarising what Funda Nenja does. This video can be viewed on our YouTube channel. We are very grateful to them for subsequent funding received.

We are very grateful for the support received from both local and international donors. Without their support, Funda Nenja would not be able to continue the work that we do. For this, we are extremely grateful. Special thanks going to Dogs Trust Worldwide for their continued support.

## Community Outreach: Animal Welfare



Our community outreach program has proven extremely beneficial in ascertaining problem areas that Funda Nenja needs to focus more on. In order to do this, our Education Officer continues to conduct home visits where she monitors and educates families on the following:

- Getting dogs off short chains
- Providing adequate shelter
- Providing clean drinking water on a daily basis
- Providing food on a daily basis
- The importance of sterilisation
- Calling for assistance when dogs are ill
- Cleaning the area in which the dogs live



All new intake children are required to complete address forms in order for us to obtain important information which is captured onto our data base. Home visits to these new children's homes is vitally important as their education is only just beginning and we need to ensure that the dog's living conditions are acceptable in case they do not return to Funda Nenja. Last year saw the implementation of a new procedure for when no-one is home during a home visit. The staff will assess the living conditions of the dog and then mark on a form that Funda Nenja had visited and which issues were found to be unacceptable, illegal or in need of improvement. This form is pinned to their door. Follow up home visits are then done a week later to check what changes had been made. If the necessary changes have not been made upon the follow up visit, the uMngeni SPCA will be advised accordingly. Our staff are constantly being upskilled and our Education Officer has familiarised herself with the Animal Protection Act and will advise owners accordingly. Where cruelty or neglect is observed, the uMngeni SPCA is also informed immediately.

It has become evident that these home visits are making a substantial impact as we are seeing less and less cruelty, neglect and unacceptable living conditions.



Every month our Education Officer holds lessons for the 3 new intake classes, and covers the following topics:

- The 5 basic freedoms
- Safety around dogs
- Understanding dogs' body language
- Rabies awareness
- Correct handling of dogs and puppies
- Importance of sterilisation
- Dog fighting



As we had to say a very sad farewell to our volunteer vet nurse, Christine Klapprodt, in July 2020, we were very grateful to Dr Daniela Steckler, who had assisted Christine on various occasions, who offered to take over from Christine on a voluntary basis.

Thanks to Dr Dannie and her wonderful team, we have been able to continue to offer primary veterinary care to both Funda Nenja dogs as well as dogs from the greater community. Rabies vaccinations, de-worming, tick & flea control and general medical issues are all attended to on Friday afternoons at dog school, free of charge. Every single new dog that joins the program is immediately vaccinated against rabies and is also de-wormed. They will be de-wormed and vaccinated again the following month, should they continue with the program. Any dogs that are requiring more extensive medical attention are admitted to the Howick Small Animal Clinic for further treatment.



Dr Lee Pachonick, our veterinarian in charge of our sterilisations has continued to run our monthly clinics. Thanks to Dogs Trust Worldwide, we were fortunate to once again receive funding for our monthly sterilisation programme. Dr Lee, and her wonderful team of volunteers, Di Santoro and Debbie Cook, run these steri clinics like a well-oiled machine. Their professionalism and caring nature ensures that the dogs are all well taken care of and discharged once they have recovered sufficiently. Each dog is driven home at the end of the day, with a bag of dog food, by our driver, Vincent Mncwabe.

## Family Support

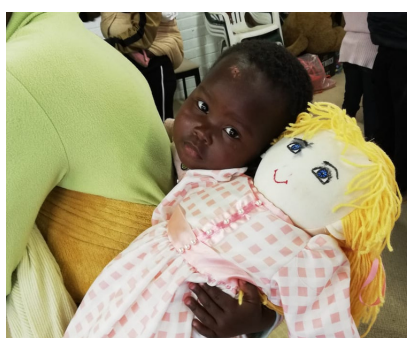
Our new Aux. Social Worker has been warmly welcomed by the community and has proved to be a real asset to the Funda Nenja team. We have continued doing home visits and encourage people to come to our classroom/counselling room for more personal counselling sessions. The majority of people find it easier to open up and talk about their situations/feelings in a more private and neutral environment.

At least once a month, our Social Worker holds life skills lessons for the children who do not own dogs and are not part of the Funda Nenja dog school program. In these lessons she covers topics such as:

- Morals
- Respect
- Manners
- Responsibilities
- Sexual awareness (our bodies)
- Bullying
- Drug and alcohol abuse
- Finding support around us
- Making good decisions



We have also held regular jumble sales where the community are invited to come and buy clothing, household items etc, at very reduced prices. These items are all donated by our followers and supporters. We are extremely grateful for these donated items which enables us to hold the jumble sales for the community of Mpophomeni. (The prices range from R2 to R20 per item).



In this harsh economic climate, and the aftermath of the Covid-19 lockdown, the increase of poverty and ill health we are seeing a huge need for psycho social assistance within the community of Mpophomeni. Our Social Worker has done a fantastic job of gaining the trust of the community and is making a noticeable impact within the community.

She has also recently teamed up with SANCA, and together they have been holding workshops and counselling sessions for people with substance abuse issues as well as parents who are struggling with children who have addiction problems. These workshops have been extremely successful and well attended with over 70 attendees at times, which shows the seriousness of the problem and the need for assistance.





In August 2020 we were able to assist a family who were living in deplorable conditions. A mother and her 3 children were all living in a tiny corrugated iron house approximately 4m x 4m in size, with no windows. One of the children, a 16 year old boy, is an instructor at Funda Nenja and has been with us since he was about 10 years old. We made an executive decision to purchase a wooden house for the family which was erected in 1 day. The family were ecstatic and extremely grateful. Their house now consists of 2 bedrooms and a lounge/kitchen area.

Another family outreach project was the Wonderbag Project. This was being run by the Howick Hospice who were selling Wonderbags at a very reduced price. Funda Nenja was able to purchase approximately 60 Wonderbags and distribute them to families in Mpophomeni.





During Covid-19 level 5 lockdown, we were able to obtain permits to go into Mpophomeni to assist the community with food parcels and hygiene packs. We were extremely grateful to members of the public for their generosity when we appealed to them for donations towards food parcels, dog food and hygiene packs. We were able to purchase enough food for both humans and dogs on a regular basis throughout level 5 lockdown and even into level 4 and level 3.



We would also like to thank Khulisani Agricultural Academy / Farm 2 You for their very generous donation of maas and their assistance with the distribution within Mpophomeni. We would also like to thank them for organising many more food parcels for us through Boxer Superstores.



# Monitoring & Evaluation

We were extremely fortunate and grateful to Dr Jim Taylor for offering to put together a fabulous Monitoring & Evaluation document in 2019. This document was completed in 2020 and covered all our achievements, our trials and tribulations and highlighted the positive impact that Funda Nenja has had on the community of Mpophomeni since we began in 2009.

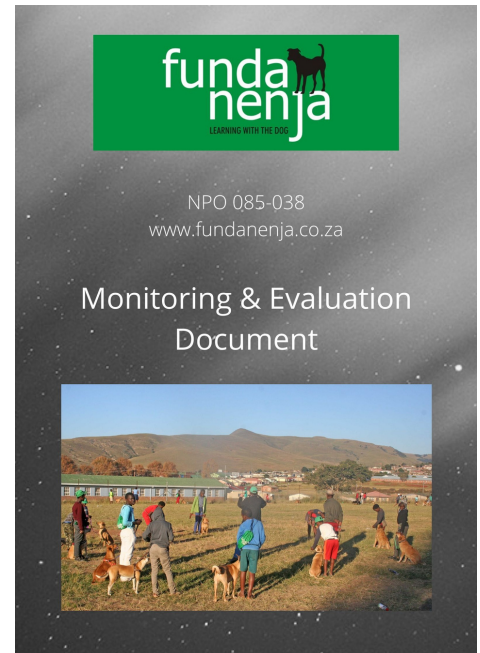
The book covers:

We were also contacted by Jennifer Norins, a PhD Student at Durban University of Technology. Ms. Norins is conducting her PhD research study on developing a culture of evaluation within non-profit organisations in South Africa. Specifically, the research aims to examine how building competence and confidence around monitoring and evaluation and awareness of evaluative thinking contributes to the development and effectiveness of civil society/non-profit organisations in South Africa. The research involves a participatory research approach, in which participating organisations are part of the process of developing evaluations and analysing results.

This research study is still in progress.





## In Conclusion

Although the Covid-19 pandemic caused fear and panic amongst many people and organisations, we are proud of the way our team handled it and made the necessary provisions and took the necessary precautions. It definitely made us think outside the box and we were extremely fortunate to have been able to keep our heads above water and continue to service the needs of both the people and dogs of Mopophomeni.

It was not all doom and gloom though, as we were able to purchase our very first Funda Nenja vehicle. A Mahindra Bolero single cab bakkie. We had it branded through LT Printers who did a brilliant job, and we are now very visible within the Mpophomeni community.



We have had a substantial amount of communication from various people around the country as well as from Mexico and Uruguay who are interested in starting similar programmes to Funda Nenja. This is a huge compliment to us and shows how our programme is growing in popularity and the fact that we are now recognised internationally is a testament to our success.

Our Facebook page is still very popular with just over 8,000 followers and just over 1,000 followers on Instagram. These numbers are increasing annually.



## Family Support:

With our new Aux. Social Worker, Zinhle Msimango, joining our team in September 2020, we have been able to attend to many more families in need of social welfare assistance and counselling. Zinhle has proven to be a real asset to Funda Nenja and we look forward to a long and prosperous relationship with her. We anticipate the need for social welfare assistance to increase as we see the negative impact that Covid-19 and lockdown has had on so many families.



We have also found our driver, Vincent Mncwabe, to be a very valuable team member and his assistance with driving both our Animal Welfare Education Officer and our Aux. Social Worker on their home visits has been extremely helpful and beneficial.

## Animal Welfare:

Although Covid-19 lockdown prevented us from continuing with our full dog school for a period of time, we were still able to attend to the needs of the dogs through distributing dog food and attending to any of their veterinary needs.

After Funda Nenja's relocation to Sifisesihle Primary School, and the lifting of the lockdown restrictions, we were grateful to be able to once again open up our dog school and continue with our education programme. We have been pleased to see the number of children wanting to join our programme each month and hope that this continues as this the beginning of their new journey with their dogs and beginning of their animal welfare education.

We very seldom see abused or malnourished dogs in Mpophomeni which is proof that the Funda Nenja programme is successful and we hope to be able to continue long into the future.

## ACCOUNTING OFFICER'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS


