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## Chairman's Report:

With another year coming to a close, I am pleased to report that we have had yet another successful year, thanks to a very capable and efficient team.

Our treasurer, Glynn Harborth is continuing to run our finances with a tight fist. We are grateful to Glynn for giving so generously of his time to ensure we maintain a strict budget.

Adrienne Oliver and Lisa Button continue to run the Friday afternoon dog school, and oversee the running of the shop and veterinary clinic. The shop has shown to be extremely popular with those in the community and we often struggle to meet the demand for dog food, collars, leashes etc.

The Friday afternoon vet clinics are continuing to be run extremely efficiently by Dr Daniela (Steckler) Hughes, who often processes around 60 to 70 dogs in a 1.5 hour period. We are very grateful to Dr Dannie for giving up her Friday afternoons for Funda Nenja and the Mpophomeni community. We must also thank Dr Dannie for the many rabies clinics that she holds in various outlying areas around Mpophomeni, Howick, Hilton and PMB.

Our outreach work is continuing, thanks to Nomonde Dlungwane and Zinhle Msimango. These 2 ladies are extremely important members of the team and are doing a fantastic job in the community.

We recently welcomed Aubrey Madondo, our new driver, to the team. Aubrey plays a vital role in making sure Nomonde and Zinhle are able to conduct their home visits, and ensures their safety whilst doing so. He is also instrumental in transporting dogs and children home after the dogs have been sterilised.

I wish to thank all our volunteers, community assistants, donors and supporters for their contributions and support during the past year without which, Funda Nenja would not have enjoyed another successful past year.

I think I speak for the whole team, when I say I am excited to see what the new year holds and look forward to having yet another successful year.

# Dog School Manager's Report

## Overview

The Funda Nenja Dog School is the heart of our organisation and the entry point for many Mpophomeni children, as well as being our portal into the community. Our dog school is where the values of kindness, respect and compassion are nurtured through the weekly dog training classes and our One Welfare approach to social change. The dog school is also one of the few extra-mural activities available to the community's youth, providing a safe space for social interaction, in addition to humane education and life skills.

## The Dog Training Programme:

This past financial year, we held 36 dog school sessions which was an improvement on the previous year's tally of 31.

A total of 224 new learners registered with the dog school over the course of the year, with 10 monthly intakes and an average of 22 registrations each time. Our largest intake for the year was 34 in September 2022, while the smallest was 14 in February 2023 when we introduced a policy requiring new learners having to present signed and completed forms on registration day, and which as anticipated, will take a while to be fully understood by would be participants.. This new policy was introduced to reduce the attrition rate of new handlers due to their failure to submit the necessary documentation.

Our highest registered monthly total attendance of the year was 85 learners in November 2022, while the lowest was 40 in February 2023, and an overall average of 57. Most of these learners were boys averaging 12 years of age, with average of 8 girls attending each week. It has been encouraging to see an increased number of girls joining the dog school and who now make up approximately 15% of our total number of learners.

In May 2022, we introduced a structured 8-week course, called the Super Dog Class, with the intention to enhance the learning experience of intermediate handlers who are committed to the dog programme. A total of 21 participants joined the 2 available courses with the positive outcome of regular attendance both during the course, and thereafter when they were promoted to the senior class.



Towards the end of the last school term of 2022, we held a simple survey to establish the level of success of our dog school programme. All the children attending our Friday afternoon sessions were interviewed by our social worker, who used a multi choice questionnaire to help us gain an insight into the impact of our outreach work. The final results were very pleasing and confirmed that we are indeed making a difference in the Mpophomeni community.

98% of those interviewed said that they attended Funda Nenja as they loved learning with their dogs.

77% said they had learnt a lot.

100% reported that their family members had learnt more about dogs since they started attending the dog school programme.

78% said that their dogs were now much better behaved.

80% indicated that they treated their dogs differently since joining Funda Nenja.

Thanks to the very generous monthly donation of dog food by the Do- More Foundation and the Gabrielle Faickney Charitable Trust, we are able to provide each learner with a small portion of dog food to take home on a weekly basis, as well as the essential dog training treats used in class. Funda Nenja believes that the welfare of the children attending the dog school programme goes hand in hand with the welfare of the dogs, so every child attending the classes on Friday afternoons was given a juice and a piece of fruit each week, thanks to the ongoing sponsorship of 2 local Spar supermarkets.



Our annual winter warmth drive in May 2022 was most successful thanks to several generous donors, including some from other parts of the county. The dogs and learners, as well as some of their needy family members, were gifted with blankets and warm clothing most of which had been hand crafted by charity projects based in Gauteng.

In June 2022, the dog school was treated yet again to another Incredible Dog Show by Lloyd Bristow. This educational and uplifting show, with Lloyd's well- trained dogs, serves to not only inspire our dog school participants, but also to show them another aspect of the world of dogs.



At the end of the school year all the children were treated to a gift bag filled with treats for both themselves and their dogs thanks to the support of kind local donors.

## **Volunteers and Community Assistants:**

Volunteers and community assistants are an essential part of the dog school and we had an average of 22 helpers, in addition to our 6 staff members, assisting at our Friday afternoon training sessions. In April 2022, Bongani Makhathini joined our team as a part-time Animal Welfare Education Officer with the added responsibility of assisting the Dog School Manager on Friday afternoons.

The team members assist with distribution of juice and fruit as well as dog food to the children, sales of collars, leads, dog food and kennels, preparing treat bags for our handlers, primary veterinary care, stock control, photos for media releases, and class instruction. Our community assistants are from the local community of Mpophomeni, while volunteers come from the surrounding areas of Hilton and Howick. Our Community Assistants all receive a monthly stipend in appreciation of their commitment and contribution to the initiative. In view of the high risk associated with the handling of unknown dogs, all our dog school team members are regularly given the recommended prophylactic rabies treatment as a precaution. In September 2022, 5 new community assistants were given this treatment at our cost, and 11 team members were given the required boosters to maintain protection against the virus. We are grateful for the assistance of Gill Lotze, a nurse practitioner, who administers these vaccinations on site for us.



At the start of winter, our dog school team were given Funda Nenja branded windbreakers to wear in inclement weather when representing the organisation, either for work purposes or at the dog school. All team members are expected to wear our branded uniforms when assisting at any of our programmes in an effort to present a professional image.

An end of year braai function for the dog school team, held at Sifisesihle School, was enjoyed by all and did much to develop team spirit and a sense of camaraderie. Certificates of appreciation, as well as gift vouchers, were presented in recognition of services given to our organisation.

## **Education and Skills Development:**

The up-skilling and development of our community assistants continues to be a priority and we take every opportunity to do so. In October 2022, Ray Gumbo and his team members from Love Howick, gave an excellent workshop on work ethics to our dog school team.



In November, we sponsored 3 of our community assistants to a work readiness course held by Love Mpophomeni which all 3 attendees found very beneficial.

In February 2023, Lisa Button and I, were invited to attend a workshop in Johannesburg hosted by the Battersea Grants and Academy Teams. This was very informative and a wonderful opportunity to network with other animal welfare organisations.



## Conclusion

Funda Nenja aims to not only impart knowledge, but to change social behaviour through our outreach work. The dogs attending our venue on Friday afternoons are mostly in very good condition and the handling skills of the majority of the people using our services indicate that the past 14 years of our presence in Mpopomeni has had a very positive impact on this community.

It has also been very pleasing to note the launching of several start-up outreach projects similar in nature to Funda Nenja and inspired by our One Welfare inter-active approach to animal welfare. These include YAPP in Diepsloot, Inja Yethu in Hillcrest and a project in the Eastern Cape by the Kariega Foundation.

The Dog School team continues to strive to improve all facets of the Friday afternoon programme and remains both flexible and adaptable to the constant challenges that present themselves. We remain committed to our vision and are most thankful to the support of all those who contribute to the success of this vital element of the Funda Nenja initiative

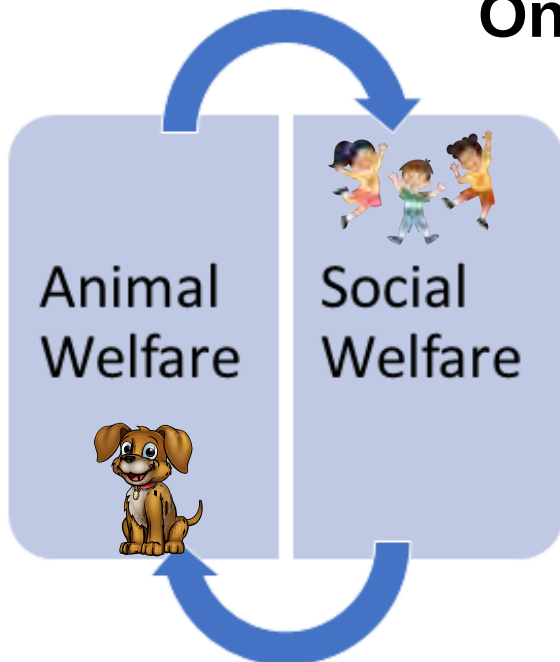


## Project Administrator's Report

He also drives all the dogs & children home after the dogs have been sterilised at our steri clinics.

## Administration & Funding

In order to comply with relevant authorities and donors Funda Nenja policies and procedures are reviewed annually. Although the organisation is still relatively small in comparison with most NPO's, we take the guidance of the King III report on governance seriously and are attempting to implement relevant policies in decision making and in financial management. Donor funds are utilised according to the terms and conditions set out in contracts.

Staff and volunteer suitability is reviewed and parent indemnity is secured.

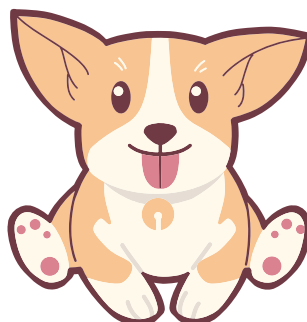

## Community Outreach:

### Animal Welfare:

Our community outreach program has proven extremely beneficial in ascertaining problem areas that Funda Nenja needs to focus more on. In order to do this, our Animal Welfare Education Officer, Nomonde Dlungwane, continues to conduct home visits for all the Funda Nenja participants, where she monitors and educates families on how to take care of their dogs.



## Report by Nomonde Dlungwane:

Our community outreach programme has made a huge difference to the dogs in the community as we continue to provide guidance to the families. The education on basic animal welfare is not only for the children who attend dog school as I have seen the need to educate the whole family on this topic. Animal welfare education serves as a guidance on how to take care of dogs in a humane way and meet their dogs' basic needs. I have continued to conduct home visits for all Funda Nenja participants as well as Funda Nenja staff. On these home visits, I monitor, educate families and check on the following:

- Getting dogs off short chains
- That adequate shelter is available
- Clean water availability on a daily basis
- Food availability on a daily basis
- Importance of sterilization
- Contacting the SPCA for dogs who are sick or injured
- Providing a clean environment/area where the dog lives

### Intake:

On the first Friday of the each month we have new and old children coming into the programme and on this day we take down their details so we can do a home visit. The children are separated into 3 classes and issued with education material.



### Home visits:

The aim is to teach the community about the importance and necessity of basic animal welfare. Lately it's been concerning that a large amount of dogs in Mpophomeni do not have water during home visits at their homes but its mainly because there is water scarcity in the area and the homes themselves do not have any water supply as their water buckets are empty and there is no water in their taps. As water is a necessity, to try and amend this, we carry some water with us during home visits and fill up the dogs water bowls if water is not available. This year, we have done a total of 627 home visits including the new intake and children who have been in the programme for some time.



On home visits we also assist with the following :

- Rabies vaccinations
- De-worming
- Treatment for ticks and flea
- Treat minor cuts and injuries

We have continued to assist the community and have donated kennels to Funda Nenja children who are worthy candidates. This programme has been a success because we are making a difference and improving the quality of life to the Mpophomeni dogs.



In the past year we have gotten a lot of people from outside of Mpophomeni wanting us to come to their communities to assist them and bit by bit we are trying to reach the outlying areas. We do hold regular Rabies vaccination clinics in the outlying areas.

### **Safety lessons and holiday workshops:**

Theory lessons for the 3 new intake classes have been held along with holiday workshops to teach children to be responsible dog owners.

I have covered topics such as

The 5 basic freedoms

- Safety around dogs
- Understanding dogs body language
- Importance of vaccines (rabies and 5 In 1)
- Importance of sterilizations
- Pit bulls awareness
- How to be a responsible dog owner

And many more topics are covered



### **School lessons:**

We were given the opportunity to hold lessons at the Sifisesihle Primary School and the Nxamalala Islamic School. We are looking forward to continue working with these schools and others to provide education, as education is the key to change.



## Veterinary:

Dr Daniela Steckler (Hughes), has continued to run our Friday afternoon veterinary clinics. She treats any minor medical issues as well as doing rabies vaccinations, tick & flea control, de-worming, 5-in-1 vaccinations etc. For any major medical issues, the dogs are either treated by the Midlands Veterinary Hospital or the SPCA. Dr Dannie usually sees between 30 and 60 dogs in an afternoon.



Dr Lee Pachonick, our veterinarian in charge of our sterilisations has continued to run our monthly clinics. Thanks to Dogs Trust Worldwide, we were fortunate to once again receive funding for our monthly sterilisation programme. Dr Lee, and her wonderful team of volunteers, Di Santoro and Debbie Cook, run these steri clinics like a well-oiled machine. Their professionalism and caring nature ensures that the dogs are all well taken care of and discharged once they have recovered sufficiently. Each dog is driven home at the end of the day, with a bag of dog food, by our driver.

## Social Welfare:

### Family Support:

Our Aux. Social Worker, Zinhle Msimango, has continued to work with the community in several ways. She has a very difficult job dealing with a variety of physical and emotional issues.

### Social Worker's Report:

#### Home visits:

We have been visiting about 12 to 15 homes per week both of old and new intake. A total of 382 home visits were conducted last year.

#### Office work:

The use of the office has started to operate more and have increased the number of visitors.

#### School Lessons:

We Provide a life skill lesson once a month to each school.

#### Holiday Clubs:

We have held workshops for children during school holidays.

We have continued to provide the following services:

- Home visits
- Families support
- Food support
- School lessons
- Individual counselling
- Community workshops

Year 2022-2023:

We have observed this year, the impacts that the Covid-19 pandemic, and the riots of 2021, have had on the community. The high number of unemployment, poverty, substance and grants abuse have risen and created family problems, which down the line, affect children and schools. This has restricted the ability of positive actions with most people.



## Home Visits:

- Filling out of assessment and consent forms
- Identify children and families in need of social services.
- Create easy access between Funda Nenja and our beneficiaries.
- Mental health services
- Assist with social problems such as inadequate resources, shelter, schooling, disabilities and unemployment
- Provide counselling
- Assist with available basic needs
- Build better communication between Funda Nenja, children and parents



## Office work:

- Administration work
- Planning
- Reports
- Counselling
- Have created a safe space for our clients
- Stakeholders meetings
- Referrals

During this period we have attended to many cases referred by the school and community coming in for assistance.



## School Lessons are CAPS aligned:

We have provided lessons that are very interactive for the grade 6 and 7 learners, where they are able to share their views and thoughts on life skills. Some of the topics are not easy to talk about as they are real life issues, which are threatening for this age groups, and there are life time changes that they encounter. We always need to create an environment that allows negative and positive talks, for mindset and better results.

## Topics Covered in School lessons and presentations:

- Body Development
- Peer Pressure
- Children's Rights
- Safety and Protection
- HIV and AIDS
- Substance and Drug abuse
- Teenage Pregnancy



## Support groups:

- Job seekers - assistance with applications
- Child & youth workshops
- Skills development programmes
- Working in collaboration with other organizations
- Stakeholders Meetings



## Holiday Clubs

We provide 3 to 4 hours of entertaining and fun learning activities for children, using dolls and puppets to act out stories and play games, and we provide refreshments. Groups of approx. 30 children grouped in different ages.

We cover topics such as:

- Coping skills
- Emotions
- Imaginary stories
- Deep breaths
- Exercises



## Referrals:

Referrals to other organizations for situations that are outside of our area of expertise.

Online services that were implemented by some departments have created better access in helping those in need.

## Community Assistance:

We have seen an appreciated growth of community engagement in assisting those who are in need. It has provided so much stability to families and created so many coping measures in the daily lives of different people. In this we count monetary donations that have reached so many families in different forms - clothing, shelter, school uniforms, shoes, food parcels and implementation of gardens. In this we speak of the big change in people's dignity and pride made out of kindness and humanity of many people. There seems to be no end to the amount of support we have received, which is teaching the community to share the kindness and generosity.
